The Desires of Your Heart

King David writes, "Delight yourself in the LORD, and He will give you the desires of your heart" (Ps 37:4).

Sounds like a formula. A transaction. A business deal. If you do A, then God will do B. And B just happens to be "the desires of your heart." When most people hear King David's words, they ponder the possibilities. They dream big dreams. They take out God's checkbook and begin writing big checks. A bigger home. A newer car. A secure job. A fully funded retirement fund. A happy family. Good health. Responsible government. Low taxes. Quality education. World peace. But is that what King David is actually saying? Is that what he means by the desires of your heart?

To better understand the desires of the heart that God promises to give, we must remember the two sources of desire that are present within every Christian. We are *simul iustus et peccator* (simultaneously saint and sinner). We have an Old Adam is us that desires one set of things and a New Man in us that desires another set of things.

The former set of desires — the desires of the flesh, those that stem from the Old Adam — is sinful and damaging to faith. Because our flesh is corrupt through deceitful desires, Saint Paul exhorts us to "put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires" (Rom 13:14).

The latter set of desires — the desires of the spirit, those that stem from the New Man — is godly and an outgrowth of faith in Jesus Christ. The Spirit within us seeks the things that are above, where Christ is (Col 3:1). The Spirit within us desires to live a godly life (2 Tim 3:12), to act honorably in all things (Heb 13:18), to pray that unbelievers may hear the Gospel and be saved (Rom 10:1), and ultimately to depart and be with Christ (Phil 1:23).

As you can see, the Christian heart is filled with two sets of desires: the desires of the flesh and the desires of the spirit. Having been baptized into Jesus Christ, your daily calling is this: "Walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh. For the desires of the flesh are against the Spirit, and the desires of the Spirit are against the flesh, for these are opposed to each other, to keep you from doing the things you want to do" (Gal 5:16-17). Saint Paul then adds, "And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires" (Gal 5:24).


That brings us back to David's words, "Delight yourself in the LORD, and He will give you the desires of your heart."

Do you want the desires of your heart? Then fill your heart with godly desires — desires such as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Fill your heart with godly desires by filling your ears with His holy Word, remembering your baptism daily, and seeking those things that are above.

Do you want the desires of your heart? Then delight yourself in the LORD. Find joy in Him. Find peace in Him. Find contentment in Him. Look to Him. Trust Him. Hold on to Him. In your weakness, He is your strength. In your sorrow, He is your hope. In your sin, He is your forgiveness and salvation.

No wonder King David prayed, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me" (Ps 51:10). When a heart has been cleansed by God, it delights in God and is filled with godly desires. Not my will, but Your will be done. What's more, God loves to grant those godly desires to His children. For their benefit. And for the world's benefit.

"Delight yourself in the LORD, and He will give you the desires of your heart" (Ps 37:4).

A Closer Look at a Hymn: From Depths of Woe I Cry to Thee

Our hymn of the day for Ash Wednesday is "From Depths of Woe I Cry to Thee" (*LSB* 607). Below is a little background on this hymn.

Toward the end of 1523 Martin Luther wrote to his friend George Spalatin, court chaplain of Frederick the Wise, inviting him to turn some psalms into German hymns for the benefit of the people. He enclosed as an example his own composition of Psalm 130 titled "From Depths of Woe I Cry to Thee." This psalm, with its portrayal of deepest repentance and highest assurance of forgiveness, constituted for Luther an expression of his own experience. Hence he was concerned that the forgiveness of sins-the very heart of Biblical and Reformation doctrine—be impressed on people's hearts. This hymn was later sung in the Wittenberg Castle Church at the burial of Frederick the Wise, as well as at the burial of John the Steadfast. It was sung by the congregation in the Church of Our Dear Lady in Halle as Luther's body lay in state there (20 February 1546) on its way from Eisleben to Wittenberg.

In preparation for Ash Wednesday and the Lenten season, take a few minutes to read through Psalm 130. And when you sing "From Depths of Woe I Cry to Thee," now you know the rest of the story.

Lent Midweek

This Lenten season we will ponder anew Christ's great

love for us during our five midweek Evening Prayer services. The Passion of Our Lord—drawn from all four Gospels and broken into five parts—will be our focus:

The Upper Room The Garden of Gethsemane The Palace of the High Priest The Praetorium Calvary



These services begin on **Wednesday, February 21** at **7:00 p.m.** and run approximately 45 minutes. If any groups within the congregation would like to sponsor a dinner to precede one of these worship services, please let Karen Moritz know ASAP. *Dinners will take place in Luther Hall only on Wednesdays where a sponsoring group has signed up.*

Individual Absolution

While the entire church year is one of acknowledging our sins and receiving Christ's forgiveness, the season of Lent vividly holds before our eyes the consequences of sin. Therefore, I have an invitation for you this Lenten season. Our gracious heavenly Father gives you Christ's forgiveness in many forms. You receive it in the corporate Absolution at the beginning of each Divine Service. You receive it through the Gospel. You receive it in the Lord's Supper. You pray for it daily in the Lord's Prayer and in your personal prayers.

However, have you ever considered receiving it individually from your pastor? This is one of the many tasks I am called to do. Some come to private confession simply to hear the absolution individually applied. That is a good enough reason all by itself. Others come because they have guilt or shame over past sins, there are specific sins that still plague them, and/or they desire not

only Christ's absolution but also pastoral counsel from God's Word and the specific prayers of their pastor. I am here for that too!

While there are many benefits to individual absolution, many stay away from this precious gift for all sorts of reasons. "What if the pastor tells his wife, the



elders, or someone else what I confess?" Remember, I vowed at my ordination and again at my installation at Divine Shepherd never to divulge the sins confessed to me, and I take that vow very seriously. Since God forgives your sins (whether "small" or "big"), who am I to bring them up to anyone? "What will the pastor think of me if he knows I ______, or struggle with _____?" So you are a sinner like me, have done things you regret, and struggle with certain temptations. That is not shocking. Remember, we are poor, miserable sinners by nature. It actually helps me be a better pastor to you if I know your sins and struggles.

Individual absolution can be handled informally in my office/study, but is usually done in the privacy of the empty sanctuary. A typical order of Individual Confession and Absolution is found in *Lutheran Service Book* on pages 292-293. Also, know that I practice what I preach. I, too, make use of brother pastors to receive this wonderful gift. Ultimately, individual absolution is not a requirement but a gift. When you desire it, know that I will be happy to administer it to you and help you in your walk of faith.


