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The Day of Thanksgiving Office of Vespers

The original thanksgiving observance was held by the Pilgrim settlers in Massachusetts during their second winter in America in December, 1621. These Pilgrims, seeking religious freedom in America, gave thanks to God for His provision for providing them land, friendly Native Americans, religious freedom, God's provision of an interpreter to the Native Americans in Squanto and for the 80 Native Americans or more that attended. Worship was a significant element of this first Thanksgiving. Three days were spent in feasting, prayer, sermons, and songs of praise.

Since then, Thanksgiving has been observed as a day to give thanks to God for His gracious and sufficient provision. President Abraham Lincoln officially set aside the last Thursday of November, in 1863, "as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father."

For Christians, the concept of Thanksgiving is found solely in the Word of God. We discover there that individuals offered up sacrifices out of gratitude in the book of Genesis. The Israelites sang a song of thanksgiving as they were delivered from Pharaoh's army after the crossing of the Red Sea. Later, the Mosaic Law set aside three times each year when the Israelites were to gather together. All three of these times, The Feast of the Passover, Pentecost, and The Feast of Tabernacles involved thanksgiving for God's provision and grace. Also, the book of Psalms is overflowing with songs of thanksgiving.




Collect for Peace


