ABOUT THE ADVENT SEASON Advent means "coming". The season of Advent marks the beginning of another year in the life of our Lord, the Church Year. The beginning of a new Church Year, like its end, reminds us that we stand that much closer to the day when Christ will return in glory to judge the living and the dead. At the same time, we ready ourselves during this season to rejoice anew on the anniversary of His birth. Such is the tension of the Christian life, for we live in "now, not yet" time. We are, at one and the same time, ever ready to go home to glory, yet ever ready to invest ourselves in the tasks of today, with an eye on tomorrow. We prepare our earthly homes and families for yet another Christmas even as we look forward to our final rest in our heavenly home with "angels, archangels and all the company of heaven."

Advent is a time to be preparing, not just preparing to observe another Christmas but rather to be preparing for our Lord's triumphant return. It is a time for self examination and repentance, a time for vigilant waiting and watching for the One whose second coming will be like a thief in the night.

Advent is also a time of hope. The color blue on our altar and Advent wreath is symbolic of the hope we Christians have because Christ has already come as our Savior. We are not afraid of His return but rather look forward to it and even pray for it as at the end of Revelation, "Amen, Come Lord Jesus." Why? Because through His life, death and resurrection Jesus has restored the peace between man and God which we once enjoyed in the Garden of Eden. Through that peace, Christians have hope while awaiting Christ's second coming, for it is then that He will receive them into their eternal home.






The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness, to bear witness about the light, that all might believe through him. He was not the light, but came to bear witness about the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

John 1:5-9

Exalt [works] as you will; but do not venture to tell me that they are my way, my life, my light. For this they are not. Christ is the only Lamb that bears the sins of the world (John 1:29). He alone is the true Light. I am very ready to praise John the Baptist's arduous and holy life, his garment of camel's hair, his drinking of water, and his eating of locusts; but I refuse to say that this is the way that leads to heaven. He himself does not bear witness to his life of privation and holiness; but he directs me to the Lord, saying (John 1:29): "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world," that is, who sacrificed Himself for your sin and made satisfaction for it. I am determined to hold to this.

Therefore, the holy evangelist John says: The Word was "the true Light." As though he wished to say: "If you do not want to go astray but are intent on finding the correct and



way to certain heaven without fail, then set your course for this one true Light, which radiates all the brightness glow and necessary for vour salvation. Otherwise we remain in darkness and in the shadow of death.
