

Dear Sheep of the Divine Shepherd:



Who is St. Nicholas and what can we learn from him, especially during this time of Advent and Christmas?

The true story of Santa Claus begins with Nicholas who lived in the 3rd century A.D. Early in his life he lost both his wealthy parents in an epidemic. Nicholas took the words of Jesus to heart from the Gospel of Matthew: "sell what you own and give the money to the poor," and so he used his whole inheritance to assist the needy, the sick, and the suffering. He dedicated his life to serving God and his neighbor and eventually became the bishop of Myra in what is now Turkey. St. Nicholas became known throughout the land for his generosity to those in need and his love for children.

Under the Roman Emperor Diocletian, who ruthlessly persecuted Christians, Bishop Nicholas suffered for his faith, was exiled and imprisoned. He was released under the emperor Constantine and participated in the Council of Nicaea in AD 325. The anniversary of his death on December 6th, 343 became a day of celebration which we now observe as St. Nicholas Day.

There are many stories, some apocryphal, regarding his generosity and love for others. One of the stories attributed to St. Nicholas tell of saving his people from famine, sparing the lives of those innocently accused, and even putting gold in stockings hung by the fireplace to help those in need. He did many kind and generous deeds in secret, expecting nothing in return.

Through the centuries St. Nicholas has been honored by Lutherans, Roman Catholics and the Greek Orthodox. By his example of generosity to those in need, especially children, St. Nicholas continues to be a model for the compassionate life.

Although it wouldn't be prudent for us to sneak into people's homes and place gold in stockings, we can remember those who are struggling; spiritually, physically, emotionally, and financially. During this festive season let us show love to our neighbor and provide where and when we can for those less fortunate than us. I thank all of you who have given encouragement, prayers, contributions to the food drive and the giving tree and simply have shown love to others.

You will be enriched in every way for all your generosity, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God. (2 Corinthians 9:11)

Blessed is he who is generous to the poor. (Proverbs 14:21). Have a blessed Advent and Christmas season.

The Measure of Our Generosity



If you open the Small Catechism, you'll find a shortened version of the Third Commandment: "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy." But if you look up the list of the Ten Commandments in Exodus, you'll find the full version:

Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore, the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Ex. 20:8–11)

Why did Luther shorten this commandment for the Small Catechism? Was it so that the kids wouldn't have so much to memorize? No, it was because Luther knew that all the

details of the Third Commandment were part of the "shadow" of the Old Testament (Col. 2:16). Or as St. Paul puts it, there is "letter" in the Old Testament law and "spirit" (2 Cor. 3:6). The details of not working on Saturday were fulfilled by Christ. That part of the Sabbath regulation no longer applies. But the spirit of the law does remain: We need to dedicate sufficient time each week to hearing God's Word and giving it honor and respect. Or as Luther sums it up in the Small Catechism's explanation to the Third Commandment: "We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it."

The same sort of analysis applies to our giving. In the Old Testament, God commanded the Israelites to give a tenth of their income to the Levites so that those men could dedicate their lives to serving in God's house, teaching the people, conducting worship, etc. In the New Testament, there is a rigid requirement listed about handing in your tax forms to church to make sure you've given enough. But the mandate to have a full-time ministry, which is the spirit of that law concerning tithing to the Levites, is right there in 1 Corinthians 9:14: "The Lord has ordained that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel."

The New Testament church's job is significantly larger than the job of Old Testament Israel. We are commanded to preach the Gospel to all nations. There was only the temple to maintain in the Old Testament, but we have churches, schools, universities and seminaries, plus missionaries everywhere. So you tell me: Can we really undertake the work of the ministry if our giving doesn't even measure up to Old Testament levels of generosity?

the food that you have so generously been leaving in the narthex, we have received \$500 from Thrivent to purchase the perishables that we all need. Each family will receive meat, potatoes, vegetables, dessert, and even some "goodies" through the Thrivent Financial grants.

Mid-size sturdy boxes are needed to pack the food and can be dropped off anytime in the nursery. (Thanks).

All food and Giving Tree donations need to be at church by **December 10** to give us enough time to purchase food, sort it by family, and have it available for pickup by Wednesday December 13. Those recipients of the Giving Tree need time to use their gift cards to purchase gifts/etc.
