

Dear Sheep of the Divine Shepherd:



As the church year unfolds, **Ash Wednesday**, which is on March 5th, marks the solemn beginning of **Lent**, a season of repentance, reflection, and renewal. For Lutherans, this day is a powerful reminder of our mortality, our need for a Savior, and the grace that is ours through Christ. But what does Ash Wednesday mean for us as Lutherans, and how does it fit into our understanding of faith?

The Meaning of Ash Wednesday Ash Wednesday derives its name from the

practice of placing ashes on the foreheads of believers in the shape of a cross while hearing the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19).

These words echo the curse spoken after humanity's fall into sin, reminding us that death is the consequence of sin and that, apart from Christ, we have no hope. The ashes symbolize both our mortality and our repentance, pointing us toward the One who conquered sin and death—Jesus Christ.

Repentance: A Central Theme Lutherans understand repentance as turning away from sin and turning toward Christ. In his 95 Theses, Martin Luther emphasized that the entire Christian life should be one of repentance—not merely an external action but a daily renewal of the heart. Ash Wednesday serves as a visible and communal expression of this ongoing reality. Repentance, however, is not about despair or trying to earn God's favor. Instead, it is about acknowledging our complete dependence on God's mercy. As we confess our sins, we cling to the promise of 1 John 1:9: "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

Law and Gospel in Ash Wednesday Ash Wednesday profoundly reflects the Law and Gospel dynamic that is central to Lutheran theology.

- **The Law**: The ashes and the words of Genesis 3:19 confront us with the reality of our sin and mortality. We are dust. We have fallen short. Left to ourselves, we stand condemned.
- **The Gospel**: The shape of the ashes—a cross—points us directly to Christ. We are not left in despair, for Jesus has taken our sin upon Himself. Through His death and resurrection, He has secured our forgiveness and eternal life.

Thus, Ash Wednesday does not leave us in sorrow but leads us toward the joy of Easter. Our repentance is met with God's boundless grace in Christ.

Lutheran Practices on Ash Wednesday While the imposition of ashes is a meaningful tradition, Lutherans do not see it as a sacrament or a requirement. Rather, it serves as a tangible sign of our repentance. Key elements of an **Ash Wednesday service** typically include:

- Confession and Absolution Acknowledging our sin and receiving God's forgiveness.
- The Imposition of Ashes A sign of repentance and humility.
- Psalm 51 David's plea for mercy and a clean heart.

• **The Lord's Supper** – That although we stand condemned as sinners, Jesus through his grace and mercy, reminds us that he is Savior and we are his children bought by his body and blood that now is given as a sign of his love for us through the forgiveness of sins.

Lent: A Journey Toward Easter Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a 40-day journey leading to Good Friday and Easter. It is a time of spiritual discipline, prayer, fasting, and reflection. However, Lutherans approach Lent not as a way to earn favor with God but as an opportunity to grow in faith, recognizing that our salvation is already fully accomplished in Christ.

Hope in the Cross Ash Wednesday is a day of both solemnity and hope. It reminds us of our need for a Savior and the assurance that we have one in Jesus Christ. As we receive the ashes and hear the words of Genesis 3:19, we do so with faith—knowing that our sin is forgiven, death is defeated, and we belong to Christ. May this season of Lent which begins on **March 5th**. lead us not into despair, but into deeper trust in the Gospel, as we journey toward the victory of Easter morning.

"Return to the Lord your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love" (Joel 2:13).

Christian Stewardship

God's Instruments, God's Stewards

For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them. (Eph. 2:10)



Some pastors refer to these words as "the most forgotten words in the Scriptures." They are forgotten because they follow the familiar and critical words before it. The preceding two verses that overshadow Ephesians 2:10 are words of justification: "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast" (Eph. 2:8–9). These are words preached regularly. They are assigned as confirmation verses. They carry with them the very heart of what it means to be a redeemed child of God!

Precisely because the previous verses are so central to salvation, they often overpower our practice of stewardship! We have been saved by grace. This is

certain and sure because of Jesus. Works play no role in our salvation. No credit taking for us! Grace is freely given. Faith is miraculously created by the Spirit and joyously received. This truth is so wonderful and so encompassing that we often miss out on WHY we are redeemed.

The grace of God revealed in Jesus calls us to faith. But St. Paul doesn't stop with grace and faith. He continues to the logical conclusion. Just like the creation declares the handiwork of God, the redemption of sinners like you and me declares His greatest handiwork! Redeemed stewards are created to reflect the grace and mercy God showers on us to others.

As Lutherans, we understand that good works flow from faith in Jesus Christ. They are the fruit of the tree of salvation into which we have been grafted by grace. Sanctification and stewardship are both on-going and

active confessions of what the Lord has done in us. These works are not always spectacular. Many times, they are simply parents showing Jesus to their children. They are compassionate actions that live out the truth of the Gospel to co-workers and even complete strangers. While they can be grand endeavors, more likely they are simple, beautiful works which highlight what Jesus has done in us.

These works aren't random either. They have been planned by God. God planned to use you as a faithful steward as you walk the road that leads you through your daily life. There are no chance encounters or coincidences. They have been planned by the Lord of the universe for the benefit of His creation. Good works are what point to God's greatest work: Jesus!

He calls you and me to walk in this faith, which flows from this grace, which has been poured out on us in Jesus. But even this is not to our credit. We are simply called to be faithful stewards of God's grace so that we may share it with those who need is as much as we do. God's Spirit carries us along in this. We are just the steward — the instrument in His hand to accomplish His plan and glorify Him!
