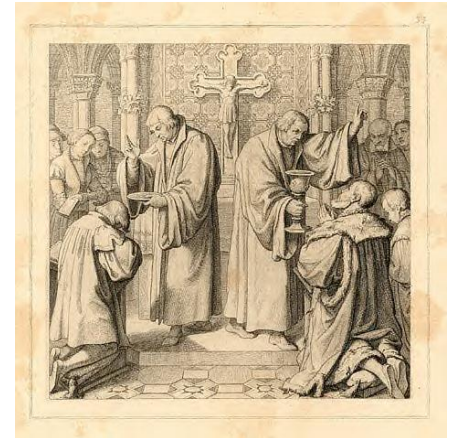


Dear Children of God:

Members in the past, present and probably in the future have asked me an interesting question. *"Why does the Pastor commune himself rather than having the elder commune him?"* This is a valid question considering that the custom at many congregations is having an elder distribute the Sacrament to the Pastor.

I have visited many congregations over the years and from personal experience I have seen that the majority of the time, an elder, or someone else from the congregation has communed the pastor. Since Scripture speaks only to the institution of the Lord's Supper and to who is worthy or unworthy, the practice of the pastor communing himself is an indifferent matter (adiaphora) and is permissible.

Back to the question of "Why do I commune myself?" The main reason that I do is historically, it was the Church's practice. There is not much in terms of documented evidence, but the evidence that is available comes from two of our noble church fathers, Martin Luther, and Martin Chemnitz. They both demonstrate that the pastor either was communed by another pastor or he communed himself.



The first mention regarding this practice comes from the one of the fathers of the church named Cyprian. At the time of Cyprian, who was martyred in 258 A.D., he wrote, "the celebrant received the elements first, after him the other clergy, then the laity, first the men and then the women." It should be noted that the no pastor gave the elements to anyone until he himself communed.

Although Cyprian's explicit mention of the celebrant's self-communion is comparatively late, it should be remembered that Cyprian was a determined traditionalist whatever his shortcomings, a lust for novelty was not among them. From that standpoint, it is reasonable to assume that the use he refers to was customary already when he wrote and had been for some time previous.

Without being too verbose and going through all the years from Cyprian to the Reformation I will now turn to Luther and his comments on the subject. In *"An Order of Mass and Communion for the Church at Wittenberg"* (1523) Luther writes, "Then, while the Agnus Dei is sung, let him (the celebrant) communicate, first himself and then the people." Again, "The bishop should also be free to decide on the order in which he will receive and administer both species. He may choose to bless both bread and wine before he takes the bread. Or else he may, between the blessing of the bread and of the wine, give the bread both to himself and to as many as desire it, then bless the wine and administer it to all."

Martin Chemnitz, who took over the reins of defending the faith after Luther also judges it proper if "the minister who communicates others also himself eats of that bread and drinks of that cup." Lastly, C.F.W. Walther, the founder of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod cites Gerhard, Carpzov, Brachman and Quenstedt (Other Lutheran Theologians) as at least allowing self-communion "if no other pastor can be found."

Most of you who have listened to my discussions on the liturgy know that I, as well as many other pastors in our Synod, do almost everything for a reason. If Scripture is silent on the subject, I then turn to the early church fathers, especially Martin Luther. As I said at the beginning of this article, an elder may give communion to the pastor without offense, but I feel more comfortable communing myself for the reasons stated above. I hope this answers the question, and I encourage you to ask me any other questions regarding doctrine or practice. Thank you for the opportunity to respond to this particular question.

May God bless our mothers this coming Mother's Day, as well as all our graduates. God be with you all.

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### [The Blessing of Godly Stewardship – May 2021](#)

One of the best and beloved psalms is **Psalm 23**, the Psalm of The Good Shepherd. We learn that Jesus Christ is our shepherd and we will not suffer want because the Lord, our Shepherd, will lead us to green pastures and beside still waters. The Lord, our shepherd, will provide for all that we need both in body and soul.

**We live as though we actually suffer from want, that the Lord, our Shepherd, will not provide for all that we need. Thus, we live as though the Lord is not our shepherd, as though we are not the Lord's sheep.**

**How do we do this?** We do it when we put anything else above Him and His provisions for us. We continuously place our importance on things of this world rather than receiving the gifts that He won for us on the cross. This is a violation of the First and Third Commandments. Do we fail to give generously of the first fruits of what the Lord has provided for us because we do not trust that God will provide all that we need? Do we look the other way when our neighbor is in need? We fail because we have a mind set on earthly, temporal things and not on heavenly, eternal things. We do this because we close our ears when the Shepherd speaks to us through his Word. The promise is sure: *"Faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the Word of Christ."* Romans 10:17

**Through the Word of God our Shepherd calls us to Himself as the Holy Spirit gathers and enlightens us with His gifts. Through that Word, we are kept holy and nourished in the one true faith.** The faith that ables us to follow our Shepherd wherever He leads us. **He promises to lead you to your true home, to the land flowing with milk and honey, the heavenly kingdom reserved for you.**

Thank you for our earthly fathers through whom You have given us life. *" Listen to your father, who gave you life."* Proverbs 23:22

The Lord is always remaining your Shepherd even when you, the sheep go astray. For Jesus seeks and saves those who are lost. ## Congregational Meeting

Congregational Meeting took place Sunday (April 25). The meeting agenda was provided via email. Since this meeting had some very significant items, I have decided to place the information in the newsletter.

- The congregation voted (15 Yeas/ 9 Nays) and the motion was passed to have Talma's ashes buried in the flower garden near Luther hall.
- Another motion was unanimously Yeas and motion passed that no other member or person shall be buried/or spread of ashes on Divine Shepherd Property
- Steeple will be placed in the front of the church; this project will be communicated to the congregation before starting
  - We understand JULIE will need to be called out before we do any digging
  - This will be a large hole, need cement and a crane to move the steeple
- The Tree near Luther Hall entrance will be removed within the next month or two
  - When this removal takes place, we will communicate to all as we do not want anyone at the church during the time of removal for safety purposes
- A motion was made to sell the property behind the shed (southern part of the church land) 33,000 sq. ft and was unanimously passed
  - An email has gone out to Lakeview Properties (Frank and Steve) informing that we had agreed to sell the land on a few contingencies
    - Lakeview pay for Divine Shepherd's attorney fees to have the legal documents reviewed
    - Lakeview to pay any fees (government or otherwise) in obtaining the land
    - if a cell tower is placed on the land that the monthly residual funds be split equally
- Streaming of the LIVE service will be stopping in the next month or two
  - more information on this will be provided as we get closer to stopping the LIVE streaming
- Coffee/Juice and treats will be provided after service

- A sign-up sheet has been posted. If no one signs up for that week there will be no treats
- Also, help with clean-up will be needed
